Community and Client Services portfolio councillor Alison Jones said these mobile devices would provide an opportunity for library staff to instruct older residents in basic digital literacy.

"They will mean small, personal classes can be conducted on the Mobile Library at regional stops like Calen, Hay Point, Midge Point and Seaforth," Cr Jones said.

Mobile classes kick off February 9 and Mackay City Library classes February 16.

The program is a partnership between the Queensland Government, Telstra, State Library of Queensland and Mackay Regional Council.

Charities only accept clothing items placed in their bins.

Waste, Health and Regulatory Services portfolio councillor Laurence Bonaventura said leaving rubbish for charities to clean up was unacceptable.

"Everyone has a responsibility

to dispose of their unwanted goods responsibly by either dropping them to one of council's waste facilities or at a charity office when they are open," Cr Bonaventura said.

"Items left outside charity bins are exposed to the elements and quickly become unusable," he said.

"There is no excuse for residents to leave their rubbish around charity bins, especially now that dump vouchers are being provided to residential properties with

their rates notices."

WANT a tip on how to Watch The Flow Of Your H2O? Water according to your soil type. Different soil types absorb and maintain moisture differently. Sandy soils are more absorbent, allowing water to soak in deeper and more quickly than other soil types, such as clay. The more absorbent the soil type, the less watering time required.
