UNDERSTANDING THE REPORT

Mackay Regional Council participated in the 2023 Australian Liveability Census as a Strategic Partner to collect community values, performance data and community ideas from local residents. As a part of this, the Council received the Executive Summary Report, Priorities, Values and Performance Report and Strategic Performance Report at the LGA-level as deliverables.

This Urban vs Rural Report is an additional report requested by the Council to get a comprehensive understanding of the liveability across both 'Urban' and 'Rural' suburbs within the Mackay LGA. The groupings for the Urban and Rural areas were provided by the Council and are in the appendix.

The report offers an overview of what is important for both urban and rural communities, assesses the liveability in their respective suburbs, and concludes by outlining the strengths and priorities specific to urban and rural areas within the Mackay LGA.

RESPONDENTS

The table below shows the number of Urban respondents and the Rural respondents. Unless noted otherwise, a 95% confidence level can be expected for all results, with a margin of error of $\pm 4.4\%$ for Urban community values (CF) data and $\pm 10.7\%$ Rural CF data and ± 2.2 pts for Urban performance (PX) data and ± 5.5 pts for Rural PX data.

PERFORMANCE

The liveability scores for each of the geographic areas are as follows -

- Mackav LGA PX62
- Mackay Urban areas PX62
- Mackay Rural areas PX56

COMMUNITY VALUES

At the LGA level, the largest number of people value the following attributes:

- Elements of natural environment (natural features, views, vegetation, topography, water, wildlife etc.) (71% in Urban vs 81% in Rural)
- General condition of public open space (street trees, footpaths, parks etc.) (70% in Urban vs 58% in Rural)
- Sense of neighbourhood safety (from crime, traffic, pollution etc.) (59% in Urban vs 60% in Rural)

URBAN PRIORITIES

The following attributes are important to most people in the Urban areas, but are currently underperforming.

- General condition of public open space (street trees, footpaths, parks etc.)
- Elements of natural environment (natural features, views, vegetation, topography, water, wildlife etc.)
- Sense of neighbourhood safety (from crime, traffic, pollution etc.)

RURAL PRIORITIES

The following attributes are important to most people in the Rural areas, but are currently underperforming.

- Walking/jogging/bike paths that connect housing to communal amenity (shops, parks etc.)
- General condition of public open space (street trees, footpaths, parks etc.)
- Local businesses that provide for daily needs (grocery stores, pharmacy, banks etc.)



Performance

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Understanding the strengths and weaknesses of Urban and Rural areas compared to the LGA can help you plan to build on your competitive advantages or improve areas that are underperforming. The best performers in Urban areas align with those in the LGA, with strengths in connectivity, character and inclusivity. Rural areas are performing better in aspects related to physical and social environments. In Urban areas, the lowest performers are things to do in the evening and uniqueness, while in Rural areas, it is night-life, accessibility, and childcare services.




