

What is a Local Area Plan?

Local Area Plans (LAP) are developed to provide locally focused planning guidance for local areas.

LAPs aim to achieve the following:

- establish a shared vision for the local area;
- address key local planning issues and capitalise on opportunities;
- establish an integrated approach to local planning; and
- sensibly manage future development outcomes.

Generally, the LAP process will generate a number of documents, maps and posters including:

- Context and Appraisal Report
- Preliminary Visioning
- Concept Plan
- Draft Planning Instruments

Given its detailed focus, a LAP can override other parts of the Planning Scheme where an inconsistency exists.

Contributors to the Local Area Planning Process

A Local Area Plan is prepared with the input from many stakeholders. Some of these are:

- the local and wider community;
- prominent land owners, businesses, residents' associations, community groups and nongovernment organisations;
- elected representatives of council (councillors) and other levels of government; and
- representatives of relevant council programs and state government agencies.

General process for developing a LAP

Phase 1

Site appreciation & technical analysis

- Site appreciation and technical analysis understand all relevant historic, current, planned and potential site issues
- Context and Appraisal Report indentify findings of site appreciation and technical analysis and articulate constraints and opportunities
- Stakeholder consultation present, discuss and gain feedback on Context and Appraisal Report with key stakeholders
- Refinement of Context and Appraisal Report

 based on findings of consultation with key
 stakeholders

Phase 2 Strategy and vision

- Preliminary Visioning develop preliminary vision based on achieving sustainability and emerging knowledge of local issues, values, opportunities and constraints.
- Stakeholder consultation present, discuss and gain feedback on preliminary visioning with key stakeholders
- Refinement of Preliminary Visioning based on outcomes of consultation with key stakeholders
- Enquiry by Design (EbD) Workshop present Context and Appraisal Report and Preliminary Visioning and explore future development options
- Concept Plan covers and builds upon findings of EbD workshop

Phase 3Broader community consultation

- Public display of Concept Plan and consultation events - Display and gain feedback on Concept Plan. Feedback potentially gained in writing, on-line surveys / forums, public meetings / workshops and personal appointments with council planners.
- Collation and summary of community feedback on Concept Plan – collate, summarise and report key findings from all feedback received.

Phase 4 Preparing the draft Local Area Plan

- Preparation of Draft Planning Instruments
 preparation of proposed changes to
 the planning scheme or elements to be
 incorporated in the new planning scheme.
- Public display of Draft Planning Instruments

 display and gain feedback on proposed changes to the planning scheme or elements to be incorporated in the new planning scheme.
- Incorporation of Draft Planning Instruments into Planning Scheme – standard planning scheme amendment/preparation process as prescribed by the Sustainable Planning Act 2009.
