

CEO'S SUMMARY

It is with pleasure that I present the consolidated CEO's report for Council operations for the month of July 2023.

Whilst each is further detailed in the report, items of note include -

- Mackay's water has again won accolades, this time winning the 'Water of Origin' competition over New South Wales entries, which is now the 2nd time in a row for this award.
- Council adopted the RV Strategy, a document that has been thoroughly worked through and one which is welcomed as setting a direction for the Mackay area in providing for and attracting the RV market.
- The new Discover Mackay website, the ultimate destination for all things related to our vibrant region, has been launched.
- Parks Blitz has started, a great initiative from our Parks and Environment team to give a full
 make-over to key parks. A total of fifty(50) parks are scheduled as part of the Parks Blitz to
 have full make-overs during the Winter season in preparation for the Summer growth season.
- The Mackay Festival of Arts was very well attended this year over a number of events, with the highlight attendance wise as always being the Wisely Wine and Food Day with 23,000 attendees.
- The annual employee Health and Wellbeing EXPO was held in July and very well attended.
 There are plans to consider combining this event with the new Safety Day initiative for 2024.



SAFETY

General snapshot

- MRC Management Safety committee meeting conducted was attended by ELT and all Safety Committee representatives. A highlight was the closing out of an opportunity to provided subsidised skin checks for staff as part of Health and Wellbeing initiatives.
- MRC staff had the opportunity to attend a fantastic presentation by Before You Dig Australia (previously known as Dial Before You Dig) and Ergon Energy. The presenters were very engaging and provided practical information on how to manage service hazards onsite. The presentations were introduced by council Directors, and well attended by staff.
- Training presentation on Workers Compensation processes developed.
- Planning continues for MRC's Safety Day, scheduled for Thursday 9 November. As well as MRC area displays, there will be several presenters on key topics. Safety Day will be hosted at the Showgrounds, allowing all employees easy access to attend. More details to follow once displays and presenters locked in.



This month there were 62 safety interactions, 12 site safety inspections across council, and 92% of MAP actions were carried out.

HIGHLIGHTS

Queensland wins 'Water of Origin' competition again

Water from the Nebo Road Water Treatment Plant (WTP) was victorious over water from New South Wales' Shoal Haven Water Treatment Plant, making council winners of the title for two successive years.

This win adds to council's winning streak, with water from the Marian WTP taking this crown in 2019 and 2021 and water from the Nebo Road WTP winning in 2018 and 2022. Council has also been awarded winners of the National Ixom Best Tasting Tap Water Competition in 2019 and 2020 and winners of the Silver Medal at the prestigious 2020 International Water Tasting Competition in Berkely Springs, in the United States.

Council shines at Queensland water operations conference

Council was once again well represented at the recent 47th Queensland Water Industry Operations (WIOA Conference), with the following accolades being achieved:

- Leon Henry, Operator of the Year Award Water Treatment Staff Member was a Nominee
- Best Paper by an Operator One of the two Papers presented by Water Treatment staff achieved third place
- 2023 Ixom Water of Origin NSW v Qld MRC's Nebo Road WTP placed first
- Mains Tapping Competition MRC Field Services Team completing the task in 2 minutes 51 seconds

RV Strategy adopted

The RV Strategy was adopted by Council on Wednesday, July 26. The implementation of identified higher priority strategy actions were due to start from the beginning of August within the current availability of resources.

Website promotes skills attraction and retention

Council recently launched the new Discover Mackay website (<u>discovermackay.com.au</u>). The website is the ultimate destination for all things related to our vibrant region – live, work, invest and explore.

A marketing plan is now being developed to promote the new website, to assist with the attraction of potential employees relocating to Mackay and for local jobseekers to source local opportunities.

Mountain Bike Trail Destination Marketing Plan developed

The preferred creative design concept for the Pioneer Valley Mountain Bike Trails Destination Branding and Marketing Plan was supported by Council at a briefing on July 19. A marketing plan will now be developed for implementation in preparation for the completion of stage one of the Pioneer Valley Mountain Bike Trails.

Gold Coast SUNS partnership activation staged

The annual Gold Coast SUNS Mackay activation weekend was held at Heritage Bank Stadium on July 14 to 15. Mackay Regional Council was represented by Deputy Mayor Karen May, Cr Justin Englert, Director of Development Services and Manager of Economic Development and Tourism.

Gold Coast SUNS facilitated a corporate partners breakfast at the new Kool Beanz Academy Carrara, with presentations by CEO Gold Coast SUNS, CEO Kool Beanz and Cr May to promote investment opportunities in the Mackay region.

On match day, the Deputy Mayor participated in a Q&A session with SUNS Chair Bob East in the Chairman's Lounge. Guests also received a Sarina Sugar Shed Cocktail Book and a satchel of Sarina Sugar Shed sweets.

Upon entering, spectators were given Discover Mackay bang-bang sticks and a "Discover Mackay Cam" was activated with the crowd at half-time. The Discover Mackay branding was also prominent around the stadium, with digital signage and a video on the big screen, as well as regular acknowledgement by the ground announcer. Cr May was also invited to toss the coin at the start of the match.

Developing Northern Australia Conference attended

A strong delegation of representatives from the Mackay, Isaac and Whitsunday regions attended the 2023 Developing Northern Australia Conference in Darwin. Director Development Services presented on the Urban Greening Strategy and Mackay Regional Council was also an exhibitor sponsor, following the conference being hosted in Mackay in 2022. The presentation and exhibition stand both attracted a lot of interest from conference delegates.

Kids 'dig' National Tree Day 2023

National Tree Day was held over two days in July, with 384 volunteers planting 3303 trees at the Finch Hatton Mountain Bike Trails site and Sandfly Creek Environmental Reserve.

Although volunteers encountered wet weather at Finch Hatton, the students' enthusiasm helped everyone power through the day. The event was supported by Mackay Toyota, who provided gloves, hats and snacks for the children, and Pioneer Catchment and Landcare Group, who provided student activities.

When mature, the trees will provide shade for recreation and habitat for local native wildlife.

Parks blitz launched

In late July, Parks Maintenance teams launched a Parks Blitz program to complete renewal and upgrade works as part of winter program. Crews merged to maximise efficiencies of labour and equipment and complete works between 6.30am and 9.30am, before returning to dry season scheduled maintenance.

All works are captured in Assetic, with costings and include:

- Pre-emergent application of herbicide to control seed bank in garden beds
- Mulching of garden beds
- Lifting and pruning of trees and hedges
- Edging and tidying of pathways and hardstand areas
- Pressure washing of parks furniture & concrete slabs

Unfortunately, weather slowed down the program, with six parks being completed in the two weeks to August and another four parks under way. Fifty parks are scheduled to be part of the Parks Blitz this winter season, improving park amenity and ease of maintenance in the upcoming summer growing season.

Mackay Festival of Arts draws crowds

The 2023 Mackay Festival of Arts was delivered, with fantastic attendances throughout July. Early survey indications from stakeholders and attendees show high satisfaction ratings with the programmed events, with the final reporting due to be completed following the delivery of the postponed Daly Bay Illuminate Event to indicate full economic impact and finalise attendances.

Wisely Wine and Food Day and Possum Magic were key highlights of the program, with more than 23,000 event-goers at Wisely Wine and Food Day and sell-out shows of Possum Magic to more than 2100 happy audience members at the MECC.

The MECC has been working with all stakeholders of Daly Bay Illuminate to confirm the new dates for the event, to be held from October 5 to 8, 2023. The event is expected to attract upwards of 25,000 people.

Art conversations assist with patient rehabilitation

Thanks to the Artspace Mackay Public Programs team, patients on two Mackay Base Hospital wards have been engaging in a new form of rehabilitation called Art Conversations. The program has been designed to align with the hospital's newly implemented Eat Walk Engage program. Each month, two small groups of two to three patients from F2 and G2 wards join Public Program staff outdoors on the naturally lit deck to view and share their thoughts about a selection of large-scale artwork prints.


Staff contingent

Employee turnover





Health and Wellbeing Expo

DocuSign Implementation

The Business Process Improvement team, in collaboration with Information Services and Employee Services, launched DocuSign for Recruitment Processes on July 17. Whilst the core of the recruitment process itself hasn't changed the workflows, approvals and acceptances are now contained within a single, auditable environment. These changes have been made to improve efficiency, transparency and security. The Business Process Improvement team is developing a rollout plan for the whole organisation.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Active and upcoming engagement

Arts and Culture Plan Consultation (consult)

Consultation has started for the Arts and Culture Plan for our region through a series of activities, including an online survey, face-to-face focus groups for the community, internal workshops, and one-on-one interviews. Consultation closes Sunday, September 17.

QCN Mackay regional connectivity project (consult and inform)

QCN has been given \$5.4 million in Federal Government funding to connect high-capacity broadband to the towns west of Mackay – Eungella, Finch Hatton, Gargett, Pinnacle and the areas surrounding Marian and Mirani. Council helped publicise this project and the two community information sessions in mid-August.

Seaforth Esplanade redevelopment (inform)

The official opening of the Seaforth Esplanade redevelopment will be followed by a community event on September 2. The event will include markets and food vans coordinated by the Seaforth Progress Association Inc, a fishing clinic provide by the Mackay Recreational Fishers Alliance, face-painting and live music. Communications for the opening are being prepared and 800 flyers have been distributed in the Seaforth locality. Two local playgrounds in Seaforth that have reached their end of life are being decommissioned with the opening of the new Seaforth Esplanade project.

Shoal Point Road bus stop (inform)

On behalf of Translink, council is overseeing the construction of a new bus stop on Shoal Point Road at the entrance of Royal Sands Estate. Notification letters were sent to surrounding residents and details were added to council's Connecting Mackay website.

Pioneer Valley Mountain Bike Trails project (inform)

As part of stage one works, council is completing intersection works on Mackay-Eungella Road for the Finch Hatton Trailhead site. Temporary traffic lights will be in place to direct single lane traffic through the work site. Details have been sent to project followers and put on council's Connecting Mackay website and social media pages.

Langford Park upgrade (inform)

Community Engagement, Parks, Design and Community Development met with the Eton Progress Association and the Mackay and District Hack and Pony Club in early August to go over the final concept plan for the park's upgrade. Both stakeholders were happy with the plan, and it has been publicised to the community and uploaded to Connecting Mackay.

Mirani Caravan Park asphalt reseal works (inform)

The Mirani Caravan Park asphalt and reseal works were completed in July. Professional photos were taken to update council's website and sent to the caravan park lessee to use for promotional purposes.

Ooralea Bio-retention basins (inform)

JMac, on behalf of council, will be resetting seven bio-retention basins in Ooralea. The works will restore the functionality and appearance of the basins. One basin site will be permanently removed and replaced with a planted garden bed. Works were due to begin in mid-August and are expected to be completed late September, weather permitting.









*The Internet Vacancy Index (IVI) is the only publicly available source of detailed data on online vacancies, including for around 350 occupations (at all skill levels), as well as for all states/territories and 37 regions. The IVI is based on a count of online job advertisements newly lodged on SEEK, CareerOne and Australian JobSearch during the month. As such, the IVI does not reflect the total number of job advertisements in the labour market as it does not include jobs advertised through other online job boards, employer websites, word of mouth, in newspapers, and advertisements in shop windows. The IVI also does not take into account of multiple positions being advertised in a single job advertisement. The data available is broken down as far as Central QLD which includes nine local Government areas and is calculated on a three-month moving average.
