THE MECC has created an Events Status Updates page on its website to act as a one-stopshop for anyone enquiring about a MECC event impacted by COVID-19 restrictions.

Manager MECC and Events Andrew Bobeldyk said there was some confusion in the wake of the Federal Government's advice that organised nonessential gatherings of more than 500 people should be

suspended from Monday, March 16

"Our first priority is to make sure our patrons are properly notified and informed if an event is postponed or cancelled," Mr Bobeldyk said.

"If your event has been postponed or cancelled, you don't need to do anything," he

"You will be contacted with the relevant details and the full refund process.

"In order to provide you with as much information as we can we have created an Events Status Updates page that will be updated daily with changes to the status of all impacted events so feel free to check back often

"The page will have the status of all events known to be cancelled, and the status of all events occurring over the next 14 days

"Patrons can assume that all MECC events not on the list wi be going ahead at this stage.



## > Encouraging residents to drive under the radar

A SPEED monitoring device will be set up to slow down traffic following safety concerns along a street with a school zone.

The mobile monitoring device, dubbed "Smiley", will be placed on Norris Road this week for a minimum of two weeks, following concerns from residents about the speed of vehicles traveling on the street.

Norris Road has a speed limit of 50km/h and operates a 40km/h school zone twice a day

Smiley will be set up to capture traffic between Phillip Street roundabout and Fitzgerald State School.

Director of Engineering and Commercial Infrastructure, Jason Devitt said that the safety of residents was a top priority.

"There are streets where we need drivers to slow down where safety concerns have been expressed," he said

"We have seen a reduction in speeding in areas that have been previously targeted with this device.



"Council is also investigating placing this device in other streets where speeding is a concern to the local community."

The device is a visible speed indicator which warns motorists if they are speeding. It will monitor and record the speed of passing traffic anonymously.
