


2022-2027 Community Programs Strategy

Acknowledgement of Traditional Custodians

Mackay Regional Council recognises and respects the cultures and histories of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and seeks to build strong relationships that create harmony between Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities and the broader community in Mackay.

Mackay Regional Council respects the Traditional Custodians of the lands that make up our region, the Yuwi and Widi people. We also acknowledge all other Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who call our region home.

Our region

Spanning over 7,600 square kilometres, the Mackay region boasts Australia's longest stretch of sub-tropical rainforest, 31 pristine beaches, and 41 unique communities. With the Pioneer Valley, a strong recreational fishing industry and a well-established and thriving agricultural and resource industry, Mackay is positioned to benefit from all the best the coast and land has to offer for its residents, businesses, and visitors.

In this region with endless opportunity, Mackay Regional Council is proud to collaborate with the community to create an environment where families, individuals and businesses are supported and empowered to thrive. We are committed to creating a safe, healthy, connected, and sustainable community, where opportunities are realised, and lifestyle is second to none.

Our region has a population of 118,723, 32.82% of which are young people between the age of 0 and 25 years. 13.17% of our residents are over the age of 65. Five percent of our community identify as Indigenous.

The Mackay region is home to Australia's largest population of Australian South Sea Islanders and our area thrives culturally due to the rich diversity of cultural groups that reside in the region.

While our region is experiencing a period of growth, influenced by the resources and agricultural sectors, this growth presents challenges for services as they endeavour to meet the social and cultural demands of community.

Our Community Programs **Strategy**

This strategy aligns with Mackay Regional Council's Corporate Plan 2022 -2027 and its commitments to the community.

The Community Programs Strategy outlines the key focus areas for the Community Programs team that will assist in the delivery of the Corporate Plan.

The focus of the Community Programs team and the core driver of their actions is ensuring that community members have a say in the future of the place they call home.

More broadly, the Community Lifestyle team, encompassing Community Programs, Artspace Mackay and Mackay Regional Council Libraries work to develop a resilient community where strong connections exist between people and place.

As a result of the work undertaken by the Community Lifestyle teams community members will report feeling safe, informed, and having equitable access to the services and facilities they need to fulfil their life choices.

Role of Community Programs with Local Government

Community development is a process of supporting community members to identify and take collective action on issues of importance to them. This process empowers community with information, access and support to create stronger, connected and resilient communities.

The Community Programs team use the community development process to create positive social and economic change. The team will lead, partner and advocate for initiatives that increase social participation, strengthen community connection, address community need and improve the region's liveability.

With inherent skills in the community development process the team works across a range of sectors with many touch points into our community. Historically, their focus has been supporting and advocating for vulnerable and at-risk population groups and developing our arts, cultural and sporting sectors. They also work with service providers and agencies to address issues of community safety, crime prevention and mental health. With their skills, knowledge and networks, the team are well positioned to support the community to respond to issues of concern.

Purpose of this **strategy**

Through a series of community engagement activities, including face to face, online sessions and a community survey, we connected with residents, visitors, service providers, not for profit organisations and

clubs to hear what is important to our community. These activities and conversations have informed the development of this strategy and will drive the actions of the team over the 2022-2027 period.

- your local library is a place to connect, build skill and source information
- fostering partnerships that result in innovative solutions to issues in our community are welcomed and encouraged
- you value council's investment in community through a range of funding programs
- you want to learn more about our Indigenous beginnings and our Australian South Sea Islander heritage
- our local artists, arts workers and venues contribute to creating our unique identity and should be supported and encouraged
- volunteering provides social connection and skill development, however many of you are unsure where to start the volunteering journey
- young people want the opportunity to participate in activities and entertainment in spaces that are separate from their home or school environment that is welcoming, inclusive and targeted to them
- young people want to be active civic participants and be part of decision-making processes that impact how they live and interact in the region

Our actions


We will:

- work with arts and business sectors to retain our creative community who develop product that reflects our region
- facilitate a range of workshops that develop the skills of the community
- advocate for community in the planning and delivery of new infrastructure
- partner with community service organisations to develop innovative solutions to address gaps in service delivery
- partner with community to celebrate and grow our international connection through Sister City programs

- use a range of mechanisms to ensure the community voice is heard
- engage with relevant parties to ensure information, services and facilities are inclusive and accessible
- work with our sport and recreation providers to ensure a range of opportunities are available in our community
- promote volunteer opportunities to enhance community connection and support
- ensure our funding programs address needs and / or create new opportunities within the community
- ensure that the needs of our marginalised, vulnerable and at-risk populations are understood and those with lived experience are included in the development of solutions to address the community's needs

- redevelop our museum assets to enable efficient management to ensure our history and heritage is preserved and reaches its potential
- engage with our Indigenous community to strengthen relationships and support the sharing of cultural heritage
- undertake research and keep up-to-date on issues impacting our community to proactively take appropriate action
- support increased youth engagement in civic decision-making processes.

We recognise that Artspace Mackay and Mackay Regional Council Libraries are key council program partners that also work to support and engage our community. Through co-ordinated collaborative partnerships the teams will deliver this strategy over 2022-2027.
