


MACKAY REGIONAL COUNCIL'S **FACILITIES AND ATTRACTIONS** ►








With 31 beaches, a picturesque blue river and pristine rainforest hinterland, there is no shortage of natural beauty to explore in Mackay.

The Mackay City Centre provides the ultimate setting to enjoy a meal or coffee with friends or a spot of shopping.

Those who enjoy the outdoors can cool down in the free, family-friendly Bluewater Lagoon, go for a walk or bike ride along the award-winning Bluewater Trail or take in the scenery at the Mackay Regional Botanic Gardens.

Just a short drive from Mackay is Sarina Sugar Shed. Take the tour and learn how sugar is produced in the only miniature working sugar mill and distillery in Australia. Enjoy a sweet treat or try the award-winning Sugar Shed rum.

Whether you're interested in fishing, camping, hiking, swimming, shopping, dining, history, theatre, music or the arts, you will love exploring our region.



First surveyed by John Mackay in 1860, this heritage listed homestead complex features a 1915 federation style Queenslander home, numerous outbuildings, and beautiful formal gardens.

Once home to the Cook family, the site showcases the life and stories of an early working cattle property and represents a significant turning point in the development of Mackay and the region.



Be inspired by the highest standard of contemporary art at Artspace Mackay, with three impressive gallery spaces and an everchanging exhibitions program.

Artspace hosts a diverse range of travelling exhibitions from national and regional gallery collections, and curates in-house exhibitions from the Mackay Regional Council Art Collection. Public and education programs for all ages including hands-on art activities, workshops, lectures, seminars, performances, floor talks, guided tours and events all take place at this cultural venue.

There are more than 100 public artworks currently on permanent display throughout Mackay, with more continuing to emerge in regional areas.






The Fifth Lane Street art transformation was completed in 2019 by 16 dedicated and talented local artists and five amazing visiting artists from across Queensland and Australia. In 2021, the laneway was further revitalised with the installation of new concrete pavement and festoon lighting.

Enjoy the artworks as they are in their static beauty or see them come alive by interacting with the seven augmented reality experiences. Simply scan the ΩR codes located at each artwork and see the artworks come to life on your phone.

Mackay's Fifth Lane was awarded 'Australia's Best Street Art Laneway' in 2021, after taking out the GOLD gong in the Australian Street Art Awards.



A tropical haven in the city! Discover the flora, fauna, café and gallery in the Mackay Regional Botanic Gardens.

With more than six kilometres of pathways over the 51-hectare site, there is plenty of room to stretch your legs, exercise and explore, or just sit and enjoy the scenic lagoon views. Showcasing a wealth of native Australian flora and tropical exotics, many of the species on display are considered rare, threatened or vulnerable in the wild.




Extensively upgraded in 2019, Queens Park boasts a range of beautifully maintained gardens, playgrounds, community spaces, sporting grounds and the delightful Ken Burgess Orchid House.

This popular recreation space also includes an offleash dog park, a rotunda, iconic shelter and cricket shed, yarning circle, cultural trail, picnic and barbecue shelters and interpretive signage.

Ken Burgess Orchid House features a large collection of stunning orchids including tree and rock-living orchids and some ground-living orchids.

Built in 1988 and recently renovated, the Ken Burgess Orchid House is one of the largest and finest orchid display houses in Australia. Orchids are displayed in a natural setting around circular walkways. Stroll through the large collection of stunning orchids in all shapes and sizes, from the bizarre to exotic.

Enjoy the tropical weather at the free threetiered lagoon providing fun for the whole family!

Located overlooking the picturesque Pioneer River in the heart of Mackay's City Centre, the facility covers an area equivalent to three 50-metre swimming pools providing a safe stinger-free environment for kids and adults alike! Key features include a waterfall connecting the two main lagoon areas, a water slide and an all-abilities play area where kids will have a ball with a drop-bucket and wading pool. Barbecue facilities and café are also located on-site.

Opening hours: Open seven days. April to July, 9am to 4.45pm and September to March, 9am to 5.45pm

Get out and explore this great region along the Bluewater Trail. Take a leisurely stroll or scenic bike ride along the award-winning shared pathway.

Many of the region's key attractions sit along the 16-kilometre trail including the Mackay Regional Botanic Gardens, Sandfly Creek Environmental Walkway, Catherine Freeman Walk, the free three-tiered Bluewater Lagoon aquatic facility, Bluewater Quay (with barbecue facilities), River Wharves and Iluka Park featuring an all-abilities playground.

Get active and enjoy the "ring of activity" which boasts pedestrian and bicycle pathways, raised boardwalks, environmental areas, disabled access and activities for children and young people.

The Bluewater Quay provides an accessible and attractive lifestyle facility for residents and tourists to enjoy.

The Bluewater Quay extends almost 250 metres and was built around the historic Leichardt tree, a common meeting point for new migrants to Mackay that arrived at the old Port district along River Street.

This prime riverfront entertainment facility boasts a children's water-play and playground, entertainment stage, picnic and barbecue areas, fishing and viewing platforms, public artworks, a boardwalk, undercover areas for markets and events, as well as space for an eatery overlooking the Pioneer River.


River Wharves is located alongside the beautiful blue Pioneer River and is part of the \$9 million Riverside Revitalisation Project.

This activated space includes shared pathways, a pavilion, seating pods, stage platforms, green open spaces, lighting, landscaping and toilet block.

Located between the Bluewater Quay and the River Street boat ramp, the River Wharves encourages locals and visitors to experience the beauty of the Pioneer River in its full entirety.

Train like a pro at Mackay's \$24 million state-of-the-art sporting facility, Mackay Aquatic and Recreation Complex (ARC).

The complex features a 50-metre Olympic-standard pool, a 25-metre warm-up pool, a 15-metre learn-to-swim pool and a 400-metre synthetic athletics track and field. The facility is open to the general public.




Ollie, grind and kickflip your way to one of the best skate parks available in regional Australia.

This \$2.2 million state-of-the-art wheeled sports facility features a three-metre competition bowl, intermediate bowl and a street run measuring almost 80 metres in length. Sugar Bowl Mackay has been designed with a community focus and features a full-size multi-sports court, informal grassed play area, climbing wall, parkour equipment, nature play area, ping pong, barbecue and picnic areas to cater for those who are less inclined to skate.

Don't miss a visit to either of these great lookouts.

Overlooking nearby islands, **Lamberts Beach Lookout** offers the perfect platform to take in our amazing region. It is also the perfect place to spot the migrating whales as they breach and play off the coast of Mackay. This stunning location is also one of the few places in Mackay you can watch both a sunrise and a sunset.

North Mackay Rotary Lookout is a fantastic spot to take in the spectacular views of the Mackay city, especially once the sun sets! The roof structure of the lookout features an in-built light show at night.

BB Print Stadium Mackay is a 12,000 capacity venue comprising an international standard rectangular field and a 1500 seat grandstand and supporting facilities.


Since its opening in August 2011, the venue has hosted NRL matches, the Professional Bull Riding Series, was the venue for the 2012 North Queensland Games opening ceremony, hosted over 10,000 fans to a KISS concert in 2013 and an evening with Sir Elton John in 2017.

The stadium is home to the 2013 Queensland Cuprugby league champions the Intrust Super CupQCCS Mackay Cutters.

You will find everything you need to plan a journey through the local area at the Mackay Region Visitor Information Centre.

Whilst there, discover the region's historical and educational attractions at the Sarina Art and Craft Centre, Sarina Museum and Sarina Art Gallery, which showcases the work of talented local artists. No stop is complete without the Tour of the Tropics at the award-winning Sarina Sugar Shed.

Sarina Sugar Shed is a multi-award-winning attraction offering an authentic paddock-to-plate-to-bottle food tourism experience.

Through daily guided tours, visitors are taken on a journey from growing sugar cane to crushing and processing it. Each tour finishes with tastings of alcoholic and food products made on-site.

With a boutique rum distillery and cafe, this unique facility is the taste of the tropics, showcasing the rich heritage of the Queensland sugar cane industry.


With our flat terrain, beautiful environment and 300+ days of glorious sunshine, the Mackay region makes leaving the car at home appealing.

From the picturesque Bluewater Trail that follows Mackay's pristine Pioneer River to the Cross City Link that provides a quick, direct commute for riders traveling between the City Centre and the Paget industrial area, Mackay has an abundance of shared pathways.

Then, once you leave the city and explore the suburbs and rural localities of the Mackay region you will find some excellent loops, scenic rides and more challenging mountain bike trails.

Council is currently working on a world-class 100km network of mountain bike trails in the Pioneer Valley.
